




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
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Life and Times of Pioneering Women of the Chatham Islands The Chatham Islands lie some 860 km east of Christchurch, surrounded by the South Pacific Ocean. There could rarely be a more isolated place, in the 19th and early 20th century, for young women to travel to as the wives of early settlers or government officials, or to live as children. The beauty of the islands could be appreciated and there were many natural resources available, but it must have been a challenge to set up a comfortable home, and to become self-sufficient and self-reliant in such a remote place. Most met that challenge fully, caring for husband and family, assisting with station and community activities, welcoming residents travelling across the island and visitors bringing news from the outside world.

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


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


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


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
